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Letter from the Director



Greetings, humanities supporters, practitioners, fans, and enthusiasts! I am happy to report that we've had a stellar first year as a university-wide research center in 2022-23. We started the year with an international symposium on Indigenous Print Cultures at the Obama Institute in Mainz, Germany, in July 2022, and rounded it off with a public lecture by Brown University Associate Professor Bathsheba Demuth in May 2023. Attendance at our events has nearly doubled from the previous year, as we made an effort to expand our in-person and hybrid offerings. In the past year alone, the HRC reached an audience in the thousands through event attendance and video viewings. Through the HRC's increase in visibility and our emerging community partnerships, such as the John R. Lewis Lecture Series and Pocahontas Reframed Film Festival, we are making a lasting impact on the Richmond community. Our Speaker Series in Environmental Humanities brought to campus some of the greatest minds working on one of the grand challenges of our time. Our Meet VCU Authors series put the spotlight on our own researchers, who generously shared exciting work from their recent books published with major university presses. We launched two new humanities Labs-Environmental Humanities and Health Humanities-which have created the momentum for inspiring collaborative work in the humanities. We thank all our supporters and collaborators for helping us amplify the voices of the humanities at VCU!

Building on this work, in 2023-24, we will be launching 5 more humanities labs fostering collaborations across fields and ranks among faculty, graduate, and undergraduate students: Public Humanities, Critical AI Studies, Memory Studies, Graphic Narratives, and Migration Studies. Bringing our research focus on Health Humanities at the HRC this year, our speakers and residential fellows will examine systematic and structural inequities that produce healthcare disparities; they will both imagine and propose alternatives by bringing together perspectives from the humanities, arts, and social sciences, as well as from the Richmond community and beyond. Our On Native Ground Initiative continues this year, spotlighting local Native artists and speakers. As you peruse this report, I also invite you to visit our website, attend our events, visit us in our office in the Valentine House, join us for Writeon-Site every Friday morning, sign up for our newsletter, and support the center in any way you can. We look forward to continued institutional support and recognition of the value and visibility the Humanities bring to an institution like VCU.

This first annual report as a university center is more than a record of the past year's successes. It is also a commitment to continue to bring humanistic inquiry into every corner of the university. The Humanities are for **all** of us.



JULY 6-9, 2022

Symposium on Indigenous Print Cultures, Media, and Literatures

The Humanities Research Center and Obama Institute at Johannes Gutenberg University organized an international symposium on Indigenous Print Cultures, Media, and Literatures in July of 2022. A special issue for the journal *American Periodicals*, co-edited by symposium organizers Cristina Stanciu and Oliver Scheiding, is forthcoming in October 2023, and a volume is in preparation for the University of Nebraska Press. We are in the early stages of organizing another international symposium in Bordeaux in June of 2024, "The Indian Citizenship Act at 100: Indigenous Rights, Indigenous Futures."

OCTOBER 14-15, 2022

Intersections: Black and Indigenous Sound in the Early Atlantic World

"Intersections" brought together scholars and community members around the subject of Black and Indigenous music and dance in the early Atlantic World. Co-organized by Sarah Finley (Christopher Newport University), Mary Caton Lingold (Virginia Commonwealth University), Miguel Valerio (Washington University in St. Louis), and Sarah Eyerly (Florida State University), and co-sponsored by the Humanities Research Center, the Omohundro Institute of Early American History and Culture at William & Mary University, Christopher Newport University, Washington University of St. Louis, the Virginia Commission for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

History and Health Program


The HRC continued its ongoing partnership with the Office of Health Equity, co-organizing several events including **Skepticism Around Clinical Trials** and **Mental Health Disparities in Marginalized Groups**, and creating corresponding modules on clinical trials, mental health disparities, and maternal health, which are scheduled to be released this fall. The HRC and Office of Health Equity are currently co-organizing a symposium for September 27, 2023 with the theme "New Perspectives on Health Equity through the Humanities."

2021-PRESENT

Pocahontas Reframed

For the second year in a row, the HRC co-sponsored the annual Pocahontas Reframed Film Festival in Richmond. The Festival aims to raise awareness about Native American language, cultures, and societies through films that share Native American perspectives. Several undergraduate students at VCU volunteered at the festival, and the HRC hopes to offer future opportunities for both undergraduate and graduate students to engage with the festival through internships and other opportunities.





FEBRUARY 21, 2023

John R. Lewis Memorial Lecture Series

In February 2023, the HRC launched the **John R. Lewis Memorial Lecture Series**, in collaboration with Sociology at VCU, the Institute for Contemporary Art, and several community organizations including Renew Richmond, Happily Natural Day, and the Kinfolk Community Empowerment Center. This series celebrates the legacy of the late John R. Lewis, co-founder of Renew Richmond and an inspirational figure in the Richmond Black Food Justice community. Each year, this lecture series will invite a central figure in Black Food Justice to Richmond for a talk and community workshop on topics such as urban agriculture, environmental justice, sustainability, and food sovereignty.

2022-23 Highlights

TRANSDISCIPLINARY INCUBATOR Through a partnership between the EH lab and VCU Institute for Sustainable Energy and Environment, the incubator awarded its first four projects in 2023 for a combined \$66,000 in seed funding. The four teams were comprised of a diverse range of scholars, from fields including urban policy, philosophy, sculpture, art education, interior design, history, sociology, religious studies, supply-chain analytics, engineering, and environmental science.

BEYOND SUSTAINABILITY This initiative, led by Jesse Goldstein, Stephen Fong, and Molly Ransone, hosted a Climate Justice Charrette that brought together over 80 students from across campus to brainstorm and develop projects that address the systemic roots of unsustainability on campus, and in the world as a whole. In March 2023, student teams presented projects with topics such as food sovereignty, rooftop gardening and greenspaces, and a plan to implement pedestrian-first infrastructure on campus.

LECTURE SERIES The lab facilitated the launch of the John R. Lewis Memorial Lecture Series, in collaboration with VCU Sociology, the ICA, and several community partners. The lab also co-organized an urban agriculture workshop at Sankofa Community Orchard with Duron Chavis and Malik Yakini.

GRANTS The Environmental Humanities lab received a \$15k grant from Virginia Humanities for the project, "Loose Parts: Exploring the Public Humanities of Child-Directed Adventure Play."

2022-23 Highlights

HEALTH HUMANITIES FELLOWS With support from the Office of Health Equity, Honors College, and School of the Arts. the lab awarded eight student fellowships (1 graduate, 7 undergraduate), two undergraduate research assistantships, and 8 faculty and community fellowships. The undergraduate fellows worked in two teams to develop online modules on the topics of Clinical Trials and Mental Health, and both groups presented their work at the annual Cultural Studies Association conference in June 2023, and NURVA Conference in January 2023.


BLACK MATERNAL HEALTH Faculty and community fellows have created publicly accessible educational modules for the History and Health program, a collaboration between the Office of Health Equity and the Humanities Research Center, which include "Health Disparities and Black Birthing People: Where we are and where we CAN go!" and "Unequal Burdens: Black Maternal Mortality and Bereavement Office."

AWARDS AND DESIGNATIONS The lab received a Transformative Learning Fund: VIP Award for 2023-25 research fellowships and activities. And in July 2023, the Health Humanities Lab undergraduate research fellowships were given VCU REAL status at level 4 classification. The lab is thrilled to be able to support 1 graduate and 10 undergraduate fellows for the 2023-24 academic year, who will be working closely with the lab and the <u>East Marshall Street Well Project</u> on their Oral History and Memorialization project.

MEDICAL HUMANITIES MINOR Lab members Adin Lears and Sachi Shimomura are working with the lab director on an NEH Connections grant to bring a medical humanities minor to VCU.

2022-23 Highlights

ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE The inaugural Karenne Wood Artist-in-Residence Ethan Brown came to VCU in September 2022. Brown is a Pamunky artist who works in gourd art, oil painting, sculpture, and film. His work, inspired by Pamunkey history and culture, Virginia's flora and fauna, dreams, intuition and spirituality, was displayed during a film screening in October 2022 entitled, "Fractures of Memory: Indigenous Futurisms and Experiential Symbolism." Thanks to the School of the Arts, Ethan Brown was given studio space to work at VCU during his residency.

LECTURE SERIES The *On Native Ground* initiative invited several Indigenous speakers to VCU whose talks coincided with the HRC's annual theme of Environmental Humanities. Kelsey Leonard, Shinnecock Nation, University of Waterloo, discussed Indigenous climate change adaptation strategies, Bethany Hughes, Choctaw Nation, University of Michigan, explored Indigenous music and performance as a form of protest, and novelist Diane Wilson, Dakota Nation discussed Indigenous food sovereignty through the lens of her novel *The Seed Keeper* in November 2022.

PAMUNKEY MUSEUM TOUR In collaboration with VCU Alumni, the HRC organized a tour of the Pamunkey Indian Museum & Cultural Center on the Pamunkey Indian reservation. Alumni and students in attendance were given a glimpse into the rich history and way of life of the Pamunkey tribe in Virginia.

Faculty Fellowships

These fellowships provide on-campus, semester-long leaves for faculty members in the humanities and humanistic social sciences to pursue research and creative work that leads to publication, exhibit, community engaged project, or public-facing event. This type of faculty support is in the service of students and the public good.

Humanities Labs

These highly interdisciplinary humanities labs bring together faculty and students (post-docs, graduate, and undergraduate) to work on ground-breaking research projects responding to the most pressing challenges to humanity today. Humanities labs launching in 2023-24 include: Public Humanities, Graphic Narratives, AI Futures, Memory Studies, and Migration Studies.

Graduate and Undergraduate Student Fellowships

These fellowships provide residential (cohort) fellowships for advanced graduate students and professional development funds for MA, MFA, and MATX students working on humanistic projects, and support undergraduate student research and professional development.
